Jiggly Jellyfish

DIFFICULTY



UK TERMS

A cute little pattern bundle of Jellyfish!
Perfect for any nursery or just as a gift or
to have in your home! You can even
make the little Jellyfish into cute little
keyrings too!



MATERIALS

YARN

Yarn - Any DK weight yarn

Note - Yarn below based on Pink and Lilac Jellyfish.

Yarn A - Light Pink 50g

Yarn B - Lilac 30g

Yarn C - Pink 30g

Yarn D - Black 10g

HOOK

4mm

OTHER ITEMS

Yarn needle

1 set 9mm safety eyes

1 set 6mm safety eyes

Fibre fill

Keyring (optional)

Scissors

STITCH ABBREVIATIONS

UK Terms

MR - Magic Ring

CH - Chain

SS - Slip Stitch

DC - Double Crochet

TR - Treble Crochet

3TR INC - 3 stitches in the same
stitch

FLO - Front Loop Only

STS - Number of stitches at the end
of the round

DC2TOG - Decrease Stitch

FINISHED SIZE

Large approx - 22cm long

Small approx - 11cm long

NOTES OR SPECIAL STITCHES

- The main Jellyfish part of the pattern works in the round.
- Anything in () work as many times as stated.
- Round 23 of the large is working the skirt of the jellyfish.
- Round 15 of the small is working the skirt of the jellyfish.



PATTERN - LARGE JELLYFISH

In **Yarn A** start with a MR.

Round 1: 6dc into the ring, pull tight [6 sts]

Round 2: (dc inc) x6 [12 sts]

Round 3: (1dc, 1dc inc) x6 [18 sts]

Round 4: 1dc, 1dc inc, (2dc, 1dc inc) x5, 1dc [24 sts]

Round 5: (3dc, 1dc inc) x6 [30 sts]

Round 6: 2dc, 1dc inc, (4dc, 1dc inc) x5, 2dc [36 sts]

Round 7: (5dc, 1dc inc) x6 [42 sts]

Round 8: 3dc, 1dc inc, (6dc, 1dc inc) x5, 3dc [48 sts]

Round 9: (7dc, 1dc inc) x6 [54 sts]

Round 10: 4dc, 1dc inc, (8dc, 1dc inc) x5, 4dc [60 sts]

Rounds 11 – 20: 60dc round [60 sts]

Round 21: (8dc, dc2tog) x 6 [54 sts]

Round 22: (7dc, dc2tog) x 6 [48 sts]

Round 23: FLO (ss, 3tr inc) x 24, ss to top of first ss made break yarn and tie off and sew ends in [48sts]

Now it's a good idea to place the eyes and embroider the mouth. I placed my eyes between rounds 17 & 18 and 4 stitches apart and the mouth I put just below the eyes in the centre using **Yarn D**. Then stuff the Jellyfish.



Base

Note: The base is where we will add the tentacles and then sew the base onto the jellyfish.

In **Yarn A** - Repeat rounds 1 – 8 of the jellyfish. LEAVE a long tail for sewing onto the jellyfish at the end.

Tentacles

Note: There are x6 of each tentacle that need to be made. After each tentacle is made tie each off and instead of sewing the ends in I used them to attach the tentacles to the base.

No 1 - make 6 - x2 each in **Yarns A, B & C**

Ch 51, in 2nd chain from the hook, 2dc in each chain to the end [100 sts]

No 2 - make 6 - x2 each in **Yarns A, B & C**

Ch 36, in 2nd chain from the hook, ss back down the chain [35 sts]





Continued.....

Assembly

Add the tentacles to the base of the jellyfish just made. All I do is knot them on the wrong side of the base and trim the ends. Then with your jellyfish stuffed you can now sew your base onto your jellyfish. Using your long tail left on the base thread it onto a needle and sew base onto the jellyfish. I went through the BLO on the base and the Back loop left from round 23 all the way around, tie off and sew all ends in.

All Finished!!

PATTERN - SMALL JELLYFISH

In **Yarn B** start with a MR.

Round 1: 6dc into the ring, pull tight [6 sts]

Round 2: (dc inc) x 6 [12 sts]

Round 3: (1dc, 1dc inc) x 6 [18 sts]

Round 4: 1dc, 1dc inc, (2dc, 1dc inc) x 5, 1dc [24 sts]

Round 5: (3dc, 1dc inc) x 6 [30 sts]

Round 6 - 12: 30dc round [30 sts]

Round 13: (3dc, dc2tog) x 6 [24 sts]

Round 14: (2dc, dc2tog) x 6 [18 sts]

Round 15: FLO (ss, 3tr inc) x 9, ss to top of first ss made break yarn and tie off and sew ends in [18sts]

Now it's a good idea to place the eyes and embroider the mouth. I placed my eyes between rounds 10 & 11 and 2 or 3 stitches apart and the mouth I put just below the eyes in the centre using **Yarn D**. Then stuff the Jellyfish.



Base

Note: The base is where we will add the tentacles and then sew the base onto the jellyfish.

In **Yarn A** - Repeat rounds 1 – 3 of the jellyfish. LEAVE a long tail for sewing onto the jellyfish at the end.



Continued.....

Tentacles

Note: There are x3 of each tentacle that need to be made. After each tentacle is made tie each off and instead of sewing the ends in I used them to attach the tentacles to the base.

No 1 - make 3 - x1 each in **Yarns A, B & C**

Ch 25, in 2nd chain from the hook, 2dc in each chain to the end [48 sts]

No 2 - make 3 - x1 each in **Yarns A, B & C**

Ch 20, in 2nd chain from the hook, ss back down the chain [19 sts]

Assembly

Add the tentacles to the base of the jellyfish just made. All I do is knot them on the wrong side of the base and trim the ends. Then with your jellyfish stuffed you can now sew your base onto your jellyfish. Using your long tail left on the base thread it onto a needle and sew base onto the jellyfish. I went through the BLO on the base and the Back loop left from round 15 all the way around, tie off and sew all ends in.

All Finished!!
